  - B. Helps Us Understand the Relationship Between the OT and NT
    - 1. Continuity between OT & NT
    - 2. How Jesus fulfills the OT. He is "Better"
    - 3. The Bible is the story of God's redemption
- II. <u>Authorship</u> <u>Date</u> <u>Audience</u>
  - A. No Author Named
    - 1. The writer identifies himself as a disciple of the Apostles (2:3)
    - 2. Possible Authors include: Paul, Barnabas, Apollos, Luke, etc.
  - B. Date
    - 1. ~ Early 60's
    - 2. Indications that the Temple was still standing

#### C. Audience

- 1. Jewish Christians (Primarily)
- 2. Those considering returning to Judaism

# Hebrews God's Final Word Hebrews 1:1-3

#### Introduction:

- Jesus is the fullest and final revelation of who God is. . .
- The heart of this section is the fact that God has spoken
- I. <u>Two Extreme Views</u>
  - A. The Skeptical View
    - 1. God has not spoken
    - 2. He has not made Himself known
  - B. God Speaks Through All Things
    - 1. Every religion / spiritual movement
    - 2. In Nature (i.e. Nature is god)
    - 3. In Yourself (little god)
- II. How God Speaks to Us (v. 1-2)
  - A. In the Past
    - 1. When "Long ago"
    - 2. To Whom "Our fathers"
    - 3. How "at many times and in many ways. . . by the prophets"
  - B. God's Final Way of Speaking
    - 1. When "last days"
    - 2. To Whom "to us"
    - 3. How "through His Son"

# III. <u>The Identity of the Son</u> (v. 2-3)

- A. King (Ultimate Ruler)
  - 1. "Heir of all things"
  - 2. "Creator of all things"
  - 3. "Upholds all things"

- B. Prophet (Ultimate Revealer of God)
  - 1. "Radiance of His glory"
  - 2. "Exact imprint of His nature"
- C. Priest (Ultimate Savior from Sins)
  - 1. "Made purification for sins"
  - 2. "Sat down at the right hand of God"

\*Seven attributes of Christ are listed; symbolic of perfection and fullness

# Better Than the Angels

### <u>Hebrews 1:1-14</u>

#### I. Looking To the Angels

- A. Angels are Very Impressive
  - 1. Messengers, Servants unto God . . . Powerful Faithful
  - 2. Encounters with Angels
    - a) Luke 1:11-13
    - b) Luke 2:9-10
    - c) Matthew 28:2-6
- B. The people addressed in this letter seemed to be tempted to elevate angels over Christ
- C. The writer sets out to correct this. (4 ways)

II. <u>Why Jesus is Better than the Angels:</u>

- A. He Has a Better Name than the Angels (v. 4-5)
  - 1. Son of God
  - 2. Psalm 2:7; 2 Samuel 7:14; (cf. Psalm 110)
- B. Jesus is Worshipped by the Angels (v. 6)
  - 1. Not to Worship Angels
    - a) Revelation 22:8-9
    - b) Colossians 2:18
    - c) Cf. Matthew 4:9-10
  - 2. Angels pay homage / Worship Him
    - a) Luke 2:13-14
    - b) John 12:37-41 w/Isaiah 6:1-3
- C. Jesus is the King and so, ruler of the Angels (v. 7-9; 13-14)
  - 1. Psalm 45:6-7
  - 2. Psalm 110
  - 3. (v. 7) Angels are His Servants

- D. Jesus is Creator of all things, including the Angels (v. 10-12)
  - 1. Citing Psalm 102:25-27 Jesus is there in the beginning as Creator
  - 2. Contrast between Creator / Creature

Conclusion - Implications

- 1. Turn to Jesus, not Angels
- 2. The Angels Worship and serve Christ

# Pay Attention!

### Hebrews 2:1-4

- We must pay attention because . . .
- I. <u>We Have a Tendency to Drift</u> (v. 1)
  - A. Our sinful hearts naturally drift away from God
    - 1. The word for "drift" means to "let slip" or "flow by" (i.e. a rudderless ship)
    - 2. What causes people to drift?
    - 3. It's very subtle at first
  - B. Does it mean that a person can lose their salvation?
    - 1. A person who is truly converted cannot lose their salvation
    - 2. Warning given because many people seem to be "saved", but are not truly converted. (i.e. Judas)
  - We must pay attention because. . .

#### II. God is Holy and Just. He Will Hold People Accountable (v. 2-3a)

- A. God held people accountable for the message of salvation delivered in the Old Testament
  - 1. The Old Testament message was true as it pointed to Christ (i.e. Abraham believed by faith)
  - 2. Those who rejected the message received just retribution
- B. God will certainly hold people accountable for the saving message of Jesus (v.3a)
  - 1. Even more clear
  - 2. Parable of Vineyard Tenants (Matthew 20:1ff)
- We must pay attention because. . .

# III. <u>The Message of Jesus is Clear and True</u> (v. 3b-4)

- A. Jesus himself came to earth and proclaimed the message
- B. The Apostles proclaimed the message
- C. The message was confirmed by the Spirit

- Your tendency to "drift"
- What can you do to keep from drifting?

- I. <u>Man's Dignity</u> (v. 5-8a)
  - A. Image Bearers (v. 6-7)
    - 1. Glory Honor Dignity
    - 2. Greater than the Angels
    - 3. "God said" vs. "Let us" (Genesis 1)
  - B. Man is made for a special purpose (v. 7)
    - 1. Reflect His glory
    - 2. Dominion over the Earth
- II. <u>Man's Depravity</u> (What Went Wrong) (v. 8b)
  - A. We do not reflect His glory as we should and we do not rule as we ought
    - 1. The Fall (Irony)
    - 2. Marred Image
    - 3. "Broken" World (Romans 8:22-24)
  - B. The "World's" perspective on the problem with humanity
    - 1. Lack of \_\_\_\_\_
    - 2. Lack of \_\_\_\_\_
    - 3. Lack of \_\_\_\_\_
- III. Man's Deliverer (v. 7-13)
  - A. The distinctiveness of who Christ is
  - B. "Tasted death for everyone"
    - 1. There is salvation in no one else
    - 2. Doesn't mean that every single person will be saved
    - 3. He brings "many" to glory
  - C. "Founder" (Pioneer)
    - 1. He suffered for our sin. . .
    - 2. He was raised. . .
    - 3. He was glorified. . .
